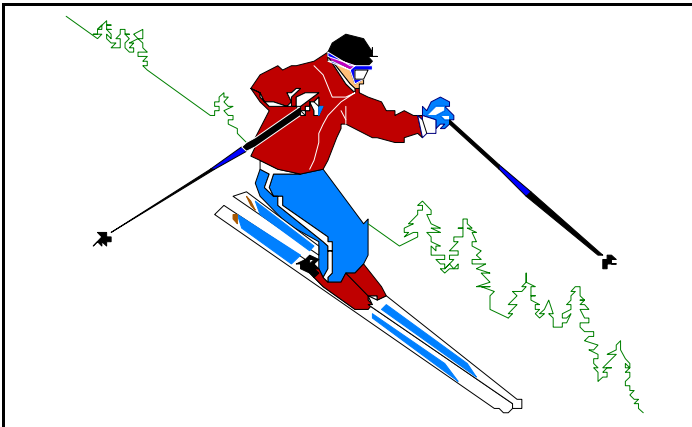

Woodbridge Lodge Annual Meeting Report

Major issues discussed this year were: roofing; water pump and well; the 2008/09 budget; 2007/08 income and expenses; lodge usage and rates; the fall work party and internet use with the phone line.

The new roof proposal will be brought before the BRSC BOG at the Summer Board meeting. We are waiting for a proposal by a club member, Kevin Amey, Jerry Crow and others to complete the work this summer.



The performance of the old water pump and well at the lodge is in question, after several pump problems this winter. There was discussion about weather to fix or replace the pump and as to the need to upgrade the well to a submerged pump. The issue was tabled for now in order to gather more information.

The budget was reviewed and will be finalized and available at the summer board meeting. It was a good year for revenue at the lodge and therefore all budgeted expenses have been met. In ad-

Located in Edgmont Township, Delaware County. Reached via Gradyville Road, which runs between State Route 352 in town of Gradyville, and State Route 252 south of Newtown Square. From I-476 (Blue Route) take State Route 3 exit west to Newtown Square, then south on State Route 252 to Gradyville Road. Or take the Rt 1 exit west/south on Rt 1 to Rt. 252 north exit and turn left on Providence Road. Follow the signs to the Park. Once inside the park, follow the signs past the office to parking area #11 and look for pavilion "A" (there are two pavilions, A & B). You can also turn in at the office and pick up a map at the upper parking lot near the top of the steps. The map shows hiking, biking and parking areas. dition there are just enough funds left in the operating budget to pay early budgeted expenses during the fall before anticipated revenue is received next winter.

Lodge usage as reported by our reservations person, Joan Strachota, showed that the month of February saw the heaviest use at the lodge with December and January slightly less use. The lodge was used in March even less, which is surprising since March traditionally has some of the best snow and most pleasant weather conditions of the winter. Maybe this is an opportunity to sponsor more club trips to the lodge, and encourage more individuals to use the lodge to take advantage of the space and normally good skiing conditions? It was decided that rates should remain at the current winter/summer amounts of: \$15/\$7.50 for members and \$20/\$10 for guests.

The fall work party date to prepare for the coming ski season will be **October 24 -- 26, 2008.** Please mark your calendars and call Glenn Weisel to participate.

Computer use of the phone service seems to be getting out of control again, not so much as to the cost but the limitations placed on the line that limits times when people can either call in or call out. We had set a limit of no computer use until after 10pm, but 9pm seems more reasonable to me. The total time spent on the phone line from December through April was over 45 hours (2750 minutes) -- yes that's correct, 45 hours -- could you imagine talking that long on the phone, or getting a bill at home with normal rates? Actually the cost is very reasonable because we have a special local calls only rate, and therefore; the cost was only \$41.97 (about \$1.07 per hour) for all of those minutes.

I think there are two things that can help: first be more respectful of the time so that calls can come in and people have use of the phone to call out. The second suggestion is that anyone using a computer should keep track of their time and make a donation to the lodge in the amount mentioned above.

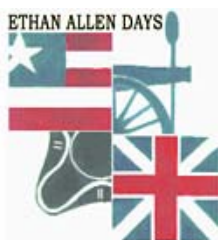


Bennington Mayfest—May 24:
